ACTIVITIES

Since the Spring Newsletter the Grant monies we mentioned have been used to purchase battery operated tools. These have helped keep encroaching vegetation at bay, amongst other paths, a section of the Dronfield Barn Rotary Walk accessed from Barnes Lane, something we call our Barnes Lane Cutback. Please think about joining us on future ventures. We would like a pool of members we can call on, sometimes only 2 to 4 of us to lighten the load on the regulars for an hour or so to clear some vegetation. Joe is happy to coordinate this so if you can speak to Joe that would help.

The North Chesterfield Way Leaflet has been out of print for a while, but the new version which we have been working on has now been printed and is with us. It will be distributed to members attending walks initially. Copies can be collected from Dronfield Library, Tapton Lock, Chesterfield VIC in Rykneld Square (and Dronfield Hall Barn). Copies will also be available at the AGM.

We are expecting a site visit from the Grants section at Derbyshire County Council in late October or early November as part of the monitoring and evaluation process so if you have any thoughts on the impact the grant monies have had to improving life in general for the community, please let us know.

Chesterfield Area Walking Festival 2024

This is planned to go ahead for the 11 – 19 May next year and the organisers are asking if we can let them know if we can lead walks again next year, what walks we would like to do and how many. The organisers need the details before the end of September (ideally). They have also asked that we do our best to encourage others to consider leading a walk. The organisers can offer support and training if necessary. The organisers are looking for a variety of walks, daytime and evening, short and longer so there's a chance here to expand your repertoire of walks to a wider and appreciative audience from further afield.

Peter Carr, Graham Gill and Joe Kelsall have all had experience of leading walks in the festival so can help you with this if you would like to get involved.

Footpath maintenance: As part of our commitment to keeping footpaths passable we are looking to set up a group of a dozen or so volunteers to assist in cutting back overgrown sections of paths as we become aware of them. Not everyone will be called upon each time but it will help to ensure enough people are available at any given point. Christmas Tree Festival at the Parish Church

We hope to be one of the up to 100 Christmas trees, all provided and decorated by local groups, clubs, schools, shops, businesses and societies, showcasing all the good work they do in Dronfield Town. And now: : a walks report from David Blackburn about a recent shared walk:

A perfect late summer day for a walk around the heather moors. 15 of us, including friends from Dronfield Footpaths and Bridleways Society and a visitor from Rotherham Metro Group followed a route of under 9 miles around Wimble Holme Hill, the Longshaw estate (Sheepdog trials day, but didn't seem to be a great deal happening as we past by). We also had a short reflection in memory of our much missed colleague ,Glyn Williams who died recently, and who would have loved walking in one of his favourite areas From Longshaw we went over White and Brown Edges, ending with steep and stony descent back our cars.

Views were amazing -we could see for miles and miles and on our return we were able to identify locations in Nottinghamshire and Lincolnshire as well as Yorkshire and Derbyshire.

Our route followed paths that the 'King of Ramblers' - Bert Ward - would have taken from his house in nearby Holmesfield , By coincidence our walk was exactly 123 years since the very first advertised walk (in the Sheffield Clarion newspaper) took place on this day in 1900. From that early beginning the grew the successful Clarion Ramblers and GHB Ward played a leading role in campaigning and developing walking into the popular pastime we enjoy today

In the Winter Walk programme we've included a re-launch of the North Chesterfield Way on Saturday 14th October. We're pleased that the Chesterfield Mayor, Councillor Mike Brady has agreed to welcome us at the start and send us off on our way and that Dronfield's Mayor, Councillor Susan Burkitt says she'll be delighted to greet us in Dronfield. 'So a Civic send off and welcome back'.

The walk on Tuesday 12th September through Haddon Fields and Manners Wood marked the last walk on our summer programme. During this period, we offered thirty-three walks with distances ranging from three to nine miles. Both the morning and Thursday evening walks proved popular and apart from a couple of weather affected walks we averaged between fifteen and twenty people on each walk. We had a great mixture of annual favourites such as the Five Ponds walk and the Dawn Chorus walk, themed walks and linear walks that made use of public transport.

This year a third of our walks took place outside the Dronfield, Unstone and Holmesfield area and we would welcome your views on whether we have struck the right balance between walks on your doorstep and ones a little further afield in the eastern moors and peak district.
